Course Description

The International Baccalaureate program Film course is a two-year in-depth study of film theory, history, and production. Year two is a continuation of what was learned from year one. Students will continue to develop essential analytical and critical thinking skills and demonstrate these skills through filmmaking as well as in written and oral communication. Students are tasked with applying technical skills to draw together knowledge and research and apply them analytically to evaluate film texts within a critical understanding of the historical, sociocultural, economic, and institutional contexts of film in more than one country. These skills involve the ability to research, plan, and organize working processes and the ability to reflect upon and evaluate film production processes and completed film texts. Students are taught to consider film texts, theories, and ideas from multiple origins and the points of view of different individuals, nations, and cultures.

Grading

Students will receive a traditional grade in this class and, upon successful completion of the course requirements, will receive credit either towards an IB diploma or an individual course college credit. To receive college credit for this course, a student must receive a 4.

Course Overview

First Semester

Unit 1 – Introduction to Film History, Theory and Movements, Part One (3 weeks)

ATL Skill Focus: Research, Thinking, Communicating, Self-Management

Learner Profile Connections: Thinking, Open-minded, Inquirer

Students will be able to identify how different genres and movements impacted the creation of the film industry and will also relate how cinema has evolved through the lens of a director, cinematographer, editor, sound designer, and screenwriter through a presentation due in week three. They will be able to compare and contrast films within genres to analyze how filmmakers create meaning by completing an analysis of two films in the same genre at the end of the unit.

Unit 2 – Film History, Theory and Movements, Part Two (5 weeks)

ATL Skill Focus: Thinking, Communication, Self-Management

Learner Profile Connections: Balanced, Risk-taker, Communicator

Students will write critical analyses, comparing two films viewed in class, from a similar movement. They will create a short analysis of the films using clips from the films and voice-over to create a 4-minute video. Students will work in small groups to create an original short film (two minutes max) using the conventions of one of these movements and will write an accompanying one-page analysis and reflection of their work indicating their production role, influences, intentions, and outcomes. This work can be used in the **Film Portfolio**.

Unit 3 – Comparative Study (6 weeks)

ATL Skill Focus:

Learner Profile Connections:

Students will carry out research into a film focus and compare and contrast their findings. They will select two films from the same genre, movement, or theory and create a script for a 10-minute maximum multimedia comparative study. This will be the second assessment required for the IB Diploma and will be due on November 22, 2024.

Unit 4 – Screenwriting (3 weeks)

ATL Skill Focus:

Learner Profile Connections:

Students will write a script for a short film, using the conventions of a genre or movement studied. The film must meet the criteria of the genre or movement and the students must be able to explain how in a written reflection. The topic of these films must meet the IB standards for content found in the Film Guide. Students will then create a 30-second trailer for their film.

Second Semester

Unit 5 – Film Production, Part One (3 weeks)

ATL Skill Focus:

Learner Profile Connections:

Students will create an original script for a 3-minute short film. Students will work in small groups (3-4) to revise one script and then plan all stages to produce a 3-minute film (including preproduction – storyboarding, location. Students will submit the completed film and a project report/reflection (800-900 words) focusing on their role in the production of the 3-minute short film.

Unit 6 – Film Production, Part Two (6 weeks)

ATL Skill Focus:

Learner Profile Connections:

Students will create an original script for a 3-minute short film. Students will work in small groups (3-4) to revise one script and then plan all stages to produce a 3-minute film (including preproduction – storyboarding, location scouting, casting, production planning, etc.; production; post-production – editing, sound design, etc.) Students will submit the completed film and a project report/reflection (800-900 words) focusing on their role in the production of the 3-minute short film. They will also write a 400-word evaluation to include their filmmaker's intentions and an evaluation of the work. This will be the deadline for the Collaborative Film Project, for the HL students only.

Unit 7 – Film Production, Part Three (3 weeks)

ATL Skill Focus:

Learner Profile Connections:

Students will create an original script for a 3-minute short film. Students will work in small groups (3-4) to revise one script and then plan all stages to produce a 3-minute film (including preproduction – storyboarding, location. Students will submit the completed film and a project report/reflection (800-900 words) focusing on their role in the production of the 3-minute short film. This will be the deadline for the Film Portfolio Assessment.

By this point, all assessments should be complete.

Unit 8 – Extension Activities (3 weeks)

Students will have a variety of short, enrichment projects to end the year.

NOTE: If a student did not submit a Textual Analysis last year or is unhappy with their predicted grade from year one, he/she will have two opportunities to re-submit the assignment during the year. Class time in year two WILL NOT be provided to complete this assessment and all assessments prescribed by IB for either the SL/HL course will need to be submitted by April 17, 2025.
