Luther Burbank High School World History Syllabus, 2022 – 2023

Course Description

In World History, students will:

- a. Trace and analyze the development of civilization in Africa, Asia, Europe, and the Americas and explore how societies change over time
- b. Describe the emergence of monarchical rule, and examine its effects on the development of government, society, and economic change
- c. Investigate the causes of global exploration, and explore the effects of imperialism and colonialism on global interactions
- d. Analyze the causes of revolutionary and nationalist movements, and evaluate their long term effects
- e. Explore the conflicts between nations to present day, and analyze their impact on modern issues
- f. Describe cultural characteristics of societies over time, including the role of women, religion, and art and literature, and investigate the effects of technological innovation on economic and social change
- g. Use social studies skills to access, interpret, and apply information from a variety of sources

Course Purpose: The purpose of the social studies disciplines is to impart particular knowledge and skills that equip students to engage actively, thoughtfully, and responsibly with their local, national, and international communities. These skills will help students succeed in high school and prepare them for college level work. Each student must meet the requirements determined by the State of Texas via the Texas Essential Knowledge and Skills (TEKS).
